10 Years Later... Congratulations to Dr. Amy Duvall!


Amy's father, Ralph, suffered a serious head injury on August 4, 1996 while working for Freightliner.

University, I moved to Charleston for
medical school. After four intensive
years of learning, I graduated from
the MUSC College of Medicine as an
MD in May 2022. I was thankfully able
to continue my training at MUSC and
am about to complete my first year of
psychiatry residency.

I simply cannot believe that I started as a freshman at Clemson a decade ago. My goal was to become a doctor then, and I achieved it. Because of the financial support from Kid's Chance of South Carolina, I was able to focus entirely on academics while at Clemson, and I started medical school without debt. Questions:

- Give us a little background on you and your family. Do you have any fun family stories you can share?
 - My favorite thing about my family is the diversity within it. My immediate family is one of the most diverse I have seen in my life, and it has provided me with amazing opportunities as far as acceptance, identity, and cultural appreciation. I was adopted from birth and that too has contributed greatly to my life, and it is something I am proud of, and my entire family is as well. My family loves strongly and passionately for one another and we are each other's biggest support system, and it has been a blessing.
- If you are comfortable, can you tell us a little about the accident that impacted you and your family?
 - My father was an engineer and was working on a job site that was under construction. While working on this job site, he got onto an elevator shaft and it threw him through several floors and he had to be helicopter lifted to the ER. He later suffered life threating injury but ended up surviving and had the opportunity to raise me for the first part of my childhood, he did pass in 2021 due to the lasting impacts of this injury.
- How did you learn about Kids' Chance?
 - I learned about Kid's Chance through my high school. I began applying for scholarships and looking into them early senior year of high school and someone had mentioned the Kid's Chance scholarship to me due to my father's accident and after doing some more research I decided to apply.

Questions:

- Give us a little background on you and your family. Do you have any fun family stories you can share?
 - o My name is Sebastian Clayton, and my parents are Kari and Tim. I have one sister named Savy, and one late brother named Timmy. My brother was in the military when he unfortunately passed away in a car accident in Alaska. I think one of my favorite stories is a yearly tradition we have where we light a huge bonfire for the Fourth of July or for New Years. The problem is that these fires have gotten so huge we need permits for them resulting in the fire department coming out a few times. It's one of my favorite little traditions with my family!
- If you are comfortable, can you tell us a little about the accident that impacted you and your family?
 - My father was moving heavy equipment called saddles for the SCDOT as a heavy equipment technician. Unfortunately, while doing this, he turned too far and damaged his back permanently. This has permanently disabled him. Later, as part of treatment for this, he had a seizure as part of the medications for it causing further anguish.
- How did you learn about Kids' Chance?
 - I believe I learned about it when googling if the state had any scholarship programs related to injured workers, when I later found that there was one not just for state employees.
- What excites you about school? And if you've graduated, what have you been up to since then?
 - I personally get excited about cobbling together large projects with little resources. Making the best of a hard situation is extremely fun to me. School tends to scratch that itch perfectly for me.
